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Victory for the Preservation Community

Sanders Amendment Passes: House Votes to Fund Advisory Council On Historic Preservation.

Late Thursday, July 13th, the U.S. House of Representatives approved the Sanders Amendment by a vote of 267(yes) to 130 (nays). The Sanders Amendment restores the funding for the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation that was cut by the House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee.

Hutchinson Amendment Defeated: House Votes Against Proposed Funding Cuts for the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

In a late vote Thursday, the U.S. House of Representatives defeated the Hutchinson Amendment by a vote of 281 (nays) to 129 (yeses). This amendment proposed the elimination of funding to the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Historic Preservation Community Rallies to Retain Federal Funding And Regulations for the Protection of Cultural Resources.

Since rumors started circulating in April, cries of "Rally the Troops" have gone out to save the Advisory Council, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the National Endowment for Humanities, and other agencies that protect our historic and cultural resources. **Thursday, we had a big victory.**

Due to the efforts of such groups as the American Cultural Resources Association, the Society for American Archaeology, and the Society for Historical Archaeology, concerned members of the CRM community came forth to have their voice heard. These organizations provided their members, as well as any concerned parties they could reach, with the names, addresses, and phone/fax numbers of members of the House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee. Some organiza-

tions banded together to hand deliver letters from their members to representatives on the Hill.

The response from the CRM community was amazing. We wrote and called our representatives in record numbers. Information and enquiries about latest developments were posted daily on numerous mailing lists on the Internet. Let's give ourselves a big pat on the back.

To those of you who directly participated in this effort, thank you.

As a follow-up, remember to call or write your representative, if their votes were favorable. Expressing our continued support will be advantageous in our continuing efforts to protect our historic resources.

Calgary Chacmool Conference: Government Approaches to Public Archaeology

Open Forum for Graduate Students on Archaeology's Future sponsored by The Graduate Student Association and The Department of Archaeology Boston University, November 11, 1995

The goal of this conference is simple: to bring together area graduate students in archaeological studies to discuss their current research and talk about issues of concern in the field. Boston University's program recently celebrated its 10th anniversary. As the only program in New England specifically designed as an interdisciplinary program in archaeological studies, we feel it is the appropriate place to initiate a discussion among graduate students of archaeology's role in scholarly communities and its obligations to the global community at large. As graduate students we are in the process of

becoming professionals and soon will be in positions to effect change within the discipline. Papers presented here should consider the direction we would like archaeology to take in order to remain a viable discipline. The first sessions are defined loosely around three topics: the interplay of theory and technology, interaction with the public, and comparative colonialism. Presenters should base their discussions on current field research. Each session will conclude with a moderated discussion. The fourth session brings together established scholars in a moderated panel discussion. Moderators and panelists will be

announced this fall. Conference attendees may also submit posters for display throughout the day.

Abstracts may be submitted on any of the first three session topics. Papers should not exceed 20 minutes in length, slide projection will be available. Abstracts should be typed and no longer than 150 words. Submissions on diskette or via email are encouraged. Deadline for submission of abstracts is September 30, 1995. Abstracts will be reviewed and accepted based on their suitability for the sessions as described above. Students will be notified of their acceptance by October 15, 1995. There is no registration fee for this conference.

History Computerization Project on the Internet

The History Computerization Project of the Regional History Center of the University of Southern California and the Los Angeles City Historical Society, in cooperation with the Conference of California Historical Societies, is building a history information network for the exchange of information between historians, librarians, archivists, museum curators, preservation groups, and historical societies. The project employs the Historical Data program, running on IBM PC-compatible computers. The program is used for both cataloging and research with all types of historical materials, including photographs, museum objects, archives, books, journals, and oral history interviews.

If you visit the History Computerization Project home page on the Internet, you will find an online order form to request free, printed, History Database tutorial on the use of computer database management for historical research, writing, and cataloging, and current schedules of the project's free workshops and exhibits. Historical photographs are displayed on the computer screen. You will also find links to historical resources at libraries, archives, museums, universities, and organizations such as the Library of Congress, the Singapore Museum, or the Louvre.

The Stone Ages go Electronic at the Museum of Antiquities

The Museum of Antiquities Releases its WWW pages

Faced with the rate of change in communications technology today, we all too easily forget the far-reaching impacts which the very earliest technologies would have had on prehistoric human populations. A new project in the Museum of Antiquities at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne brings together the very earliest and the very latest technologies by translating an exhibition about the Stone Age hunter gatherers into virtual space for distribution on the World Wide Web.

"Flints and Stones: Real Life in Prehistory" was inspired by the Spielberg "Flintstones" film and it uses cartoon images, a reconstructed cave and actors in role, along with a

more conventional archaeological presentation to dispel the image of Stone Age people as grunting, hairy, knuckle-dragging primitives. The exhibition doubled the visitor figures for the museum and won the BT North of England Museum and Gallery Award for the Most Innovative Display, but as a display in real space it had a limited life span.

Now the physical limitations have been overcome by re-creating the exhibition in virtual space in a project of a sort not previously tackled by a British museum. The keys to a successful transfer to hyper-media format were the strong visual dimension given by the cartoons and a structure which juxtaposed the cartoon view and an archaeological perspective. This readily lent itself to hypertext programming links and the sort of multi-layered treatment which makes effective use of the WWW medium.

As a research project, this has inevitably thrown up such matters as hardware and software requirements, storage capacity, design and programming requirements, as well as consider-

ation of how an exhibition works in virtual space as compared with real space, and such organisational aspects such as copyright issues, and not forgetting questions of costing and why or whether a museum should embark on such a project. We are happy to talk about these matters.
