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What Are Programmatic Agreements?

Under Section 106 Programmatic Agreements provide a way for a whole Federal agency program, or a specifically complicated undertaking, to comply with Section 106 by means of an option to the standard process set forth in 36 CFR Part 800. Programmatic Agreements (PAs) originated in the 1979 Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's concept of Programmatic Memoranda of Agreements (PMOAs). While PMOAs are now obsolete, the idea was that through PMOAs, an agency could achieve compliance with Section 106 for an entire program, instead of on a project-by-project, property-by-property basis. Under the 1979 regulations, the conditions under which PMOAs could be executed were somewhat limited. To generate a PMOA an agency had to first place a notice in the Federal Register and set a time period for public comment. However, in practice this process proved too inflexible for regional applications of PMOAs.

By the time the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's (ACHP) 1986 regulations were issued, years of experience enabled the use of programmatic agreements under one universal category, with more flexible requirements for public notification and participation. Currently, all such agreement are termed as Programmatic Agreements (PAs) and are authorized under 36CFR 800.13.

Examples of situations appropriate for the use of PAs are:

- effects are similar and repetitive, or are multi-State or national in scope;
- effects cannot be fully determined in advance of the undertaking;
- non-Federal parties are delegated major responsibilities; or

 development of regional or landmanagement plans, or routine management at Federal installations are involved.

The regulations assume that Federal agencies will initiate PAs, but the regulations do not specifically state that a Federal agency must take the lead in the development of a PA. The idea for a PA can also originate from the ACHP, a State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), from the National Council of State Historic Preservation Officers (NCSHPO), or from another party, depending on the circumstances. In any case, the SHPO must be consulted for any PA that affects historic properties within the SHPO's domain. A PA that is to be applied nationwide must include consultation with the NCSHPO.

If all parties consulted cannot agree to the terms of a PA, then the PA cannot go into effect. Affected agencies must then comply with Section 106 for each individual resource that would have been covered by the PA, in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4-6. If all parties consulted agree to the terms of a PA, then the lead agency official and the ACHP must sign the PA. Consulted parties may also sign "as appropriate."

The following is an example of when a PA should and should not be sought:

Three Federal agencies are all planning to assist in water development projects. Agency A will assist in construction of a reservoir for the purpose of flood control. The areas of effect are well defined, including the area to be acquired for the

reservoir itself and certain downstream areas where flooding will be relieved. Agency A should follow 36 CFR 800.406 to take into account the effects of its undertaking, which can be clearly defined on the basis of surveys and property-specific determinations of effect.

Agency B plans to assist in construction of a reservoir and associated irrigation system. Alternative reservoir sites have been defined, as have pipeline and canal corridors, but the areas to be irrigated are not well defined. Agency B should probably follow 36 CFR 800.4-6 because it can identify many of the properties subject to clearly definable effects by the undertaking.

Agency C plans to assist in construction of various not-yet-defined facilities to help manage water in a river basin. Agency C clearly should seek a PA.

Intermountain Antiquities Computer System (IMACS) to Use New Software

After an extensive search, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has finally located a software package that will serve as the program for the IMACS, the archaeological site file database for Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, and Nevada. Cultural Resource Information System (CRIS) was developed by the Cultural Resource Research Center, a branch of the Army Corp of Engineers. When completed, the CRIS system will allow easy entry of IMACS information, retrieval, manipulation, and use for research and analysis, planning documents, literature searches, etc. Additional advantages of CRIS is that it allows additional tracking databases to be created and will allow for the expansion, modification, and improvement of the IMACS form.

When completed CRIS will be public domain software, which means BLM can provide the software free of charge to all cultural resource consultants permitted to work in applicable states. In this manner consultants can submit site data on disk in the CRIS format, which can be read directly into the system. Already several consultants, agencies, and the Utah SHPO have expressed interest in CRIS. Hopefully, the system will be completed by the end of November.

Alaska Natives Receive Historic Preservation Fund Grants

The National Park Service awarded 36 groups nationwide grants for a broad range of cultural heritage projects. Twelve tribes (none from Alaska) received funds to assume the responsibilities of historic preservation officers for review and compliance projects that impact tribal lands. Three Alaska groups grants from the FY 1996 Historic Preservation Fund Grants to Indian Tribes and Alaska Natives. The Alaska awards are:

Kenaitze Indian Tribe Training Project, \$50,000. Kenaitze Indian Tribe, IRA. Conduct a collaborative effort to train Endi'Ina Ya Ida'Ina committee members from five villages in museum administration, conservation, curation, and exhibition of objects. The committee will provide guidance to Pratt Museum personnel as to the proper procedures in the handling and interpretation of Nena'ina culturally affiliated items.

Alutiq Plantlore: An Interpretive Signage Project for Kodiak's Parks, \$35,000. Kodiak Area Native Association. Develop a series of interpretive signs on Alutiq plantlore and an ethnobotanical trail guide to coincide with the interpretive signs.

Assessment of the Historic and Heritage Potential of an Archaeological Site, \$12,000. Port Graham Corporation. Conduct intensive one month archaeological testing at a site located in the village of Port Graham. Artifacts found will remain with the village.
